## Ceanothus americanus (New Jersey Tea)

New Jersey Tea (Ceanothus americanus, aka Moun- shrub borders and native plantings, or in groupings. tain Snowbell) is a deciduous shrub native to all areas of North Carolina. Its native habitat is open, deciduous withstand droughty conditions and make it great for woods; woodland edges; oak savannas; and meadows. It was selected as the 2013 North Carolina Wildflower of the Year, a program managed by the North Carolina Botanical Garden with some financial support from the Garden Club of North Carolina. Native Americans used it as a tea to treat respiratory tract infections.

From May to June it is covered with fragrant, longlasting, 2- to 5-in. long panicles of cup-shaped creamy white flowers. The flowers' nectar makes the plant highly attractive to hummingbirds, butterflies, bees, moths, predatory wasps and other insects. It displays black, brown/copper, green, or red/burgundy fruit from June to July. Songbirds eat its seeds.

This heat-tolerant multi-stemmed shrub is low growing and low maintenance, and it is droughttolerant once established. With a medium growth rate and a rounded crown, it typically grows to 2- to 3-ft. tall and 3- to 5-ft. wide.

Use this shrub in foundations, as a specimen, in

Thick, woody, red roots go deep and help the plant erosion control on slopes, but they also make established shrubs difficult to transplant.

New Jersey Tea grows best in well-drained sandy loam or rocky soils in full sun (6 or more hours of direct sunlight a day) to partial shade (direct sunlight for 2 to 6 hours).

It has no serious insect or disease problems, but it is susceptible to leaf spot and powdery mildew. In wet soils it is prone to root rot.
